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1 John: So We May Know Book Title

Why and How We Study the Scriptures

It is essential for every Christian to know why we study the Scriptures and how to study. Teachers and preachers of God's word are vitally important to us. They are God-given and equipped to teach and preach. However, you and I must learn to study the word of God for ourselves. Peter explains that we should be able to give an account of the hope that is within us. (1 Peter 3:15) Our hope is in Christ Jesus, the gospel of truth. We must grow in our knowledge of God and what He has done through His Son. This maturity comes through the study of God's word. I learned a long time ago that I must own my faith. I cannot live off of someone else's. Neither can you.

I mentioned earlier there are preachers and teachers of God's word. Our generation is not lacking in this area. However, all of the teachers and preachers we are exposed to are not preaching and teaching a true gospel. We are warned over and over in the word of God to watch out for false teachers and to test the spirits to see if they are from God. Without a working knowledge of God's Word, how can you and I know what is truth and what is false? We cannot!

The Attributes of the Bible

Before we get into how we study, I think we would be wise to look at the attributes of the Bible. I encounter many people who say they believe every word of the Bible but in reality have no idea what the Bible teaches let alone what the Bible teaches about itself.

The Bible is the breathed out an inspired word of God. It is GOD'S WORD. The Bible is the revelation of what God teaches about who He is and His gospel. There are several attributes of the Bible that we need to know and keep in mind as we read and study. Without the conviction of these truths, we can and will waver in our security of God's Word.

1) **God's word is infallible, without mistakes**. The bible is without any errors and is perfect because it is just that, God's Word. Psalm 19:7 says of itself, "*The Law of the LORD is perfect*." It goes without saying that if God is perfect then His word, Our Bible, is excellent.

2) God's Word is Inerrant. Inerrant means the Bible is incapable of being wrong. Every word of God is pure and true. Psalm 12:6, "The words of the LORD are pure words; as silver tried in a furnace on the earth, refined seven times."

3) God's Word is complete. Many believe that God still gives revelation today. They do not believe that the 66 books we have are complete. However, the book of Revelation ends with a testimony of its completeness and warning. Revelation 22:18-19, "I testify to everyone who hears the words of the prophecy of this book: If anyone adds to them, God will add to him the plagues which are written in this book: and if anyone takes away from the words of the book of prophecy, God will take away his part in the tree of life from the holy city, which are written in this book."

4) God's Word is Our Final Authority. "The LORD has spoken." Isaiah 1:2. You and I can ask questions of the Bible. We can discuss the meanings of the Bible. But we must never question the Bible nor discuss whether or not it is true.

5) *God's Word is Sufficient*. God's word is enough, and it is adequate. Peter teaches that God has given us everything we need for life and for godliness. **2** Peter 1:3.

<u>The word of God is sufficient for salvation</u>. The Holy Scriptures are able to make us wise unto salvation. *Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the words of Christ*.

2 Timothy 3:15, Romans 10:17. <u>The Word of God is sufficient for growing</u> <u>in maturity.</u> God's word is alive and active and able (Hebrews 4:12) it is profitable for reproof, correction, and training in righteousness.

How We Study the Bible.

This bible study is written to take you through each verse and chapter of the book in which you are studying. Its approach is not to ask what does the text mean to me but rather what does the text say? You will not find fluff nor words that pet the flesh and make you feel good about yourself. It will, however, build you up in the truth and knowledge of God and His word.

We will use four steps of reading and studying the Bible.

Prayer: Commit this study to prayer. Proverbs 3:2 says," If you cry for discernment, lift your voice for understanding, then you will discern the fear of the Lord and discover the knowledge of God. Crying and raising our voices to God is prayer. It is humbling ourselves before the God of the universe recognizing our need and guidance from Him. If we call to Him He tells us He will answer and tell us great and unsearchable things we do not know! Jeremiah 33:3. The Lord gives wisdom and from His mouth come knowledge and understanding.

Observation: Observing the text is the act of noting and recording facts and events. Not only will you be answering questions from the book you will also be reading the text of God's word many times. Observation answers the

question, "What does the text say?" The process of reading the book and answering questions from the text is going to be work on your part. Some days more work than others. There are times when reading a short devotion is acceptable, but it cannot be our only food. You dear sister are equipped with a teacher, the Holy Spirit of God, that will teach and bring you to the knowledge of the truth. Dig deep into God's word and never be afraid.

Interpretation: Interpretation answers the question, "What does the text mean?" After reading the text several times and answering the study questions, you will understand what God meant and be able to explain it. (A side note: there are times that we will not have a complete understanding of the passage we are studying. Rely on the guidance and teaching of the Holy Spirit. Do not get discouraged. Continue to pray and ask for wisdom. God will give it to you in His timing.)

Coming to accurate interpretation involves several steps: Reading the text, answering the study questions which also include, cross-referencing and word studies. Once you have taken these steps, you will be ready for accurate application.

Application: After observation, interpretation, and continual prayer you are ready to ask the question, "How does the meaning of this passage apply to me?" "What does God want me to do with what I have learned?" The answer to these two questions is quite simple! God wants you to know Him, to glorify Him, and enjoy Him forever. He also desires a changed life. Discovering the Truths of God's Word and applying them accurately does not happen overnight. Learning requires a lifetime of study and discipline.

How to Use This Study?

You are encouraged to work through your lesson consistently. I recommend studying a few questions a day. Do not try to work through a complete lesson in one sitting. You will be overwhelmed and not retain all you need to know. This study is written for you to do on your own. However, you could gather a few friends and study together. Decide if you want to answer all of the questions or pick the ones you feel beneficial for your group.

Please Note, the NASB translation was used to write this study. If you use a different translation be aware, the wording may be a little different.

Commentaries: Commentaries are good resources. However, it is not recommended that you use one during your study. Remember a commentary is man's interpretation of what the text is teaching. Learn on your own before reading what others have learned.

The NASB translation was used in the writing of this study. It was chosen because of its faithfulness to the original text.

1 John: Lesson 1

So That We May Know

1 John 1:1-10

What We Have Seen and Heard We Proclaim to You

John was an eyewitness to the word of life, Jesus Christ. He touched him, he saw Him, he looked at Him, and he unashamedly proclaimed Him. In straightforward and precise terms, John writes so that we may know that we are in Christ. In the book of James, James listed the characteristics of genuine faith, and John follows suit in this epistle, listing one aspect after another of the true child of God. There are no mincing of words. He gets straight to the point.

- 1. Read 1 John 1:1-10. According to 1 John 1:4, what is the author's purpose in writing this letter?
- 2. According to 1 John 5:13, to whom is John writing?
- 3. Scattered through this little book, we find seven more places where the author gives his purpose for writing this letter. Read the following Scripture references and record the author's purpose in writing by each reference.

1 John 2:1-

1 John 2:12-

1 John 2:13-

1 John 2:14-

1 John 2:21-

1 John 2:26-

1 John 5:13-

- 4. As you read the book of 1 John, you will be introduced to false teachings and heresies that inevitably enter the church. All heresy is brought in by men who do not know the true eternal Christ. In John's opening words, he tells his readers of his personal experiences with Christ. Read 1 John 1:1-2 and record what John says about his first-hand knowledge of Christ.
- 5. What does John teach us about Christ in his opening statement? Read the following Scripture references and record what you learn.

Read 1 John 1:1 with John 1:1-4-

Read 1 John 1:2 with John 1:14-

6. We learn in 1 John 1:2, the life was manifested. What does John mean when he says the life, eternal life, Christ, was manifested? Look up the word manifested in your word study tools and record its definition.

Manifested: Strong's Reference # 5319-

Christ, Who was in the beginning with God, became manifest as a human man and appeared not only to John but many. John ensures his readers know Christ existed with God and was not a created being. The Scriptures teach that Christ is God. The One Who is, Who was, and Who is to come. Revelation 1:8. John sets up his authority as one who can testify about Christ and refute those who claim they are in Christ but are not.

7. The Apostles who saw Christ, touched Christ, and heard the teachings of Christ were not the only ones who could have fellowship with Christ and the Father. What reason does John give in 1 John 1:3, for testifying and proclaiming Christ?

8. Those who hear and believe the message proclaimed also have fellowship with Christ, the Father, and one another. What does 1 John 1:3 mean by fellowship? Look up the word in your word study tools and record the definition.

9. Look up the following Scripture references that relate to a believer's fellowship with God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. Record any insights you may see.

10. Read John 17:11 with John 17:20-26. Record what these texts teach about fellowship between the Christian and God, Christ, and other believers.

- 11. Fellowship is sharing something each believer has in common with each other. What do we fellowship around? What do we have in common? What is our confession? Read Philemon 1:6, 1 Timothy 3:16, and 1 John 1:3.
- 12. Because John is writing to believers to test and affirm their salvation, he starts this epistle with his testimony of meeting and knowing the true eternal life-giving Christ. His motive is not only to rebuke the heretics who disrupt the church but to direct the true believer to the fullness of joy through our common fellowship with God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Look up the word joy in your word study tools and record its meaning.

Joy: Strong's Reference # 5479-

13. Joy is inner happiness, peace in the heart that remains no matter the circumstances. Its foundation is knowing the true, unchanging goodness and grace of God given to us through Jesus Christ. Joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. It grows and remains as we press into Christ and the truths we learn through the Word, prayer, and the working of God through our sanctification.

Read the following Scripture references that directs us to rejoice in the Lord. Record any insight you may glean from these verses.

- 14. According to 1 John 1:5, what message did John and the Apostles hear from Christ and announce to the church?

- 16. God is absolutely perfect and nothing exists in His character that has an effect upon His truth and holiness. Read the following Scripture references and record what is taught about the perfection of God.

17. In the Bible darkness is associated with error or falsehood, evil, sin or wrongdoing. Read the following Scripture references and record what they teach about darkness.

19. Read Colossians 1:13. Record what this verse teaches about the true believer.

- 20. The true believer has been rescued from the domain of darkness and transferred into the kingdom of God, transferred into the kingdom of Light. How does John describe the man or woman who practices walking in the darkness?
- 21. What does James say is the characteristic of one with genuine faith? Read James 1:22-25.
- 22. What is the walk of a true believer, according to 1 John 1:7?
- 23. What does the blood of Jesus continually do, according to 1 John 1:7?
- 24. What does 1 John 1:8 say about those who claim they have no sin?

- 25. According to 1 John 1:9, what is an indication of genuine salvation?
- 26. What does it mean to confess our sin? Look up the word confess in your word study tools and record the definition.

Confess: Strong's Reference # 3670-

- 27. What does God do when we continually confess our sin, according to 1 John 1:9?
- 28. What do we learn about the character of God in 1 John 1:9?

A continual confession of sin is characteristic of a true believer. However, John's focus in this passage is not confessing every single sin. I do not think we know or see every sin we think or commit. The focus is a life marked by acknowledging the sin that still dwells in us and confessing that sin before the God of Light.

- 29. When someone says they do not sin what are they saying about God, according to 1 John 1:10?
- 30. When someone says they do not sin what are they revealing about themselves, according to 1 John 1:10?
- 31. Read what the Apostle Paul says about himself in Romans 7:14-24. Summarize what Paul is saying about sin.
- 32. If we confess our sin, who will set us free and what is the outcome? Read Romans 7:25-8:2.

33. This simple yet deep epistle is calling us to make sure we are truly in Christ. Read the following Scripture references and record what they are teaching.

So That We May Know

1 John 2:1-17

My Little Children I am Writing to You So That You May Not Sin

John uses the term, My little children, to address those who are born of God, those who are true followers of Christ. He uses the word "my" to show affection for those who share in a common faith and also addresses them as children as a warning. As a child of God there are requirements that distinguish us from the world. God sets forth commandments that you and I must strive to obey. He lovingly calls us to listen with our hearts and minds as a father who is teaching and training his own chidren. Let us heed the warnings and as little children believe, trust, and obey our Father who is in heaven.

1. Read 1 John 1-11.

John is writing these things so that we know what sin is before God. This brings up the importance of reading and studying the word of God. For without it we are ignorant and vulnerable against the schemes of the devil, ignorant of the capabilities of our own flesh, and ignorant of God and His commands. We learned in 1 John 1:8-11, that sin is universal. Everyone sins, even true confessing believers. John is pulling together the importance of striving against sin, the importance of confession when we do, knowing God's commands, and understanding we have forgiveness.

2. What reason does John give for writing to the believer in 1 John 2:1?

- 3. John is calling the believer to obedience and not sin. In this letter he is carefully laying out what sin is and calling the believer to examine his or her heart to see if our walk lines up with the word of God. Let's stop here for a minute. It is important that we look at what the word sin means. You may be thinking that is an elementary principle, or one we should already know. You would be right but it is always good to be reminded. 1 John 3:4 gives a perfect definition of sin. Look up 1 John 3:4 and record how it defines sin.
- 4. Now look up the word sin in your word study tools and record the Greek definition.

5. Look up the following Scripture references that teach about sin. Record next to each verse what they are telling those to whom they are spoken.

6. Sin is a refusal to submit to God's Law. When you and I sin we are basically saying I am going to do what I want. We are showing pride, arrogance and a lack of belief in God. We are also trampling under our feet the finished work of Christ on the cross. John has in mind this very truth. He is stopping us, calling us to think about God, what Christ accomplished on the cross, and to whom we belong . He is writing these things so that we may not sin. But, what about when we do?

Look at 1 John 2:1 and record what comfort John gives.

7. What is an advocate? Look up the word in your word study tools and record its meaning.

Advocate: Strong's reference # 3875-

- 8. Who is our advocate, our helper, the one who intercedes for the believer who sins, according to 1 John 2:1?
- 9. John not only tells us Christ is our advocate, how does he describe Him in 1 John 2:1?

Read the Amplified version of 1 John 2:1, "My little children (believers, dear ones), I am writing you these things so that you will not sin *and* violate God's law. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate [who will intercede for us] with the Father: Jesus Christ the righteous [the upright, the just One, who conforms to the Father's will in every way—purpose, thought, and action]."

10. What do we learn about Christ in 1 John 2:2?

11. Because Christ is the righteous one, the upright One, the just One, the One who conforms perfectly to the will of God in every way He is able to be the propitiation for our sins and not only ours but for those of the whole world. Look up the following Scripture references and record what they teach about Christ and Him being our propitiation.

12. Look up the word propitiation in your word study tools and record its meaning.

Propitiation: Strong's Reference # 2434-

After reading the above scriptures about sin and learning the definition of propitiation, what should our attitude be toward sinning?

A true believer should never think just because Christ appeased God by the sacrifice of Himself we can go on sinning. These truths should cause us to pause and consider before we step into sin. However, we are going to sin. There is no such thing as sinless perfection. That truth should not give us cause to throw up our hands and give in or give up. Because when we sin we have an advocate with the Father.

13. Read Romans 7:14-25 with hope and thankfullness. Record what you learn about the law, sin, God's grace and mercy from His written word.

14. Why does John say, Christ died not only for our sins but for the sins of the whole world? We need to be careful that we do not fall into the camp that believes in universal salvation. Meaning, in the end everyone will be saved regardless. This is a heresy and taught nowhere in the scriptures. The Scriptures teach that those who are saved are the ones who repent and believe in Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sin. John 5:24. Because of the gravity of our sin and the great power of Christ's atoning sacrifice, John is showing us that Christ's sacrifice extends to the whole world. It is good enough and powerful enough to save the entire world but only those who believe are saved. Forgiveness of sin is offered to every tribe and nation but again only those who believe will be saved.

What do we learn about salvation from the following Scripture references?

- 16. According to 1 John 2:3, how do we know we know God?
- 17. In 1 John 2:4, how does John describe those who do not keep God's commandments?
- 18. A true believer, those who are born again, display a habit of obedience. What does 1 John 2:5 say about those who keep God's word?

If there is in our hearts a true love for God and an effort, a desire to be obedient to God, we can know we are in Him and have true fellowship with Him.

- 19. To be in Christ is to have fellowship not only with Christ but with God Himself. Read 1 John1:3. We cannot have one without the other. It is important for us to know there is only one way to have fellowship with God. Read John 14:6 with 1 John 5:20 and record what these verses teach.
- 20. If we say we abide in Christ and have fellowship with God through Christ, what should be the practice of our life? Read 1 John 2:6?
- 21. Read Matthew 22:34-40. According to Matthew 22:37, what is the greatest commandment?
- 22. According to Matthew 22:39, what is the second greatest commandment?

23. In 1 John 2:1-6, John lays out a definition of the first and greatest commandment and how a true believer responds to it. According to 1 John 2:10 how does a true believer respond to the second greatest commandment?

24. Read 1 John 2:7-11. In verse 7 John reminds the readers of what they had heard from the beginning concerning love when the gospel was preached to them. In this sense the command was old, it had been heard. Now John says, I am giving you a new commandment. He is elevating or bringing more light to the command to love your brothers and sisters in Christ. First he uses Christ as the ultimate example. Re-read verse 8 and notice he says, the new commandment is true in Christ. What does he mean, it is true in Christ? Let's look at a few Scripture references that will help shed light on what John is teaching in this passage. Record what you learn after each reference.

John 13:34-35-

John 10:15-

Philippians 2:3-8-

25. Christ showed, personified the love instructed in the second greatest commandment to love your neighbor as yourself. Record other ways Christ showed His love for and to you. I will give a starting place! Ephesians 5:2.

- 26. Read 1 John 2:8 again. The new commandment is true in Christ and also in us, the believer. If you are truly in Christ the command to love your brother is possible in all circumstances. How? Read Romans 5:5 and 1 John 4:19. Record what these verses are teaching.
- 27. In 1 John 2 verses 8-10 we see the word LIGHT referenced three times in the NASB Translation. This is referring to Christ. He is the true perfect Light of love, manifesting the love of God. He is the Light of the world. John 8:12. Read the following Scripture references, record what they teach and notice the light of love.

1 John 1:5-

John 9:5-

Matthew 5:14-

The word darkness in verse 8 is referring to the darkness that is in the world manifested by hate, greed, and selfishness what we call spiritual darkness. Where Christ the LIGHT shines through us in our sphere of influence, that darkness is exposed. Love exposes the darkness. The commandment of love has come true in Christ and is coming true in us.

How are you manifesting love to those in your sphere of influence?

- 28. Read 1 John 2:9-11. According to verse 10 who is in the Light or in Christ? What constitutes his lifestyle?
- 29. Describe the man in 1 John 2:9 and 11.

- 30. Read the following Scriptures references and record what they teach about the talker in verse 9.
 - 1 John 3:10-

1 John 3:15-

1 John 4:20-

- 31. In question 28, the man in darkness was referred to as "a talker." He is characterized this way because his words do not match his walk. Where is the man living according to 1 John 2:11? Read Also John 12:35.
- 32. Does the man in darkness know where he is going? Why? Read 1 John 2:11 again for your answer.
- 33. Read James 1:22-25. What is the command in verse 22?

John writes this book so that we may know whether we are truly in Christ, so we will know if we are in the household of God, His family. What a grace from God! As you have walked through some of these commands and markers of a believer in 1 John you may walk away doubting your salvation or fall into a place of being guilty of disobedience. I am not implying that being disobedient is proper or good but if you find yourself in either place of doubting or disobedience, praise God, because He is revealing truth to you. Do not run but place yourself at the feet of Christ in confession and repentance. 34. In the beginning of 1 John 2, John is bold in his explanation of sin. As it should be. There is no room for fluff when it comes to sin. However, after John so boldly exposes and brings to light the truths from God, he now brings the believer some encouragement by reminding them why he is writing and telling them to remember what he wrote in the past. Read 1 John 2:12-14. What family titles does John use as he addresses the church in 1 John 2:12-14?

- 35. John uses two different words for children in 1 John 2:12-13. In verse 12 John is using the term little children to refer to all of the believers as a born again group of people who are in fellowship with God, Christ, and one another. What do we learn about them in 1 John 2:12?
- 36. Why are their sins forgiven, according to 1 John 2:12?
- 37. After addressing the church body as a whole in 1 John 2:12, John now turns to address the differing maturity levels of the believers who make up the church body. In 1 John 2:13-14, John addresses the fathers, perhaps older but especially more mature in their walk with Christ. What reason is given for Johns writing to them in these verses?
- 38. Next, John turns to the young men, less mature than the fathers but more mature than when they first believed. What reason is given for John writing to them in 1 John 2:13-14?
- 39. Finally, he turns to the children, the newest believers. What does he say to this group in 1 John 2:13?

40. Where are you in your walk with Christ? Have you been walking with the Lord for many years, perhaps only a few years, or are you a new believer? Why would it be important and essential for any believer to possess the characteristics John records?

1 John: Lesson 3

So That We May Know

1 John 2:18-29

I Am Writing to You Concerning Those Who Are Trying to Deceive You

It takes knowledge and discernment for the child of God to know and recognize deception. In this passage, John warns and describes the ones who are TRYING to deceive the true child of God. Can a true child of God be deceived? Can they be carried away by the wiles of the devil and his workers of iniquity? In this lesson, we will go through 1 John and answer these questions.

- 1. First, read 1 John 2:18-29 to understand what John is saying.
- 2. We learned in the last lesson that the god of this world and his world system will end. But we also know Christ will rule and reign over His kingdom for eternity. If we abide in Him and He in us, we will live forever with Him in His kingdom. However, while we live in our temporary home, there will be deception and a war for our affection and devotion. Keep this in mind as we strive to learn what John is teaching and urging in this passage. Who does John address in 1 John 2:18, and what had they heard?

3. John warned the church that the "ANTICHRIST" was coming. This warning refers to the end-time figure that will eventually come according to God's final plan. John does not go into great detail about this figure, nor will we in this study. However, it would be helpful to know something about him. Read 2 Thessalonians 2:1-10 and record the teaching on this person.

- 4. What else does John tell the children in 1 John 2:18?
- 5. John uses the words the last hour in this section as a metaphor or figure of speech to describe the time in which he lives. We can also say this is the last hour. The clock is ticking, and then the end will come. Look at the following Scripture references and record what they teach about the last hour or the last days.

When I say I cannot understand, I do not mean intellectually. I understand the words but only by the grace of God do you and I understand its implications. Ask the Lord to help you see and understand these marvelous truths tucked away in 1 John 3:1-10. Also ask to see areas in your life that need conformed to the truths He reveals!

Confidence in Prayer and Living Our Days

- 1. Who is John writing to in this letter? Why has he written? 1 John 5:13.
- 2. We are blessed to know we can confidently trust God's promise of eternal life through His Son, Jesus Christ. Our confidence does not stop there. John moves on to show us we can be confident when we go to God in prayer. What confidence do we have before God? 1 John 5:14-15?
- 3. Read what Hebrews 4:16 teaches about prayer and record what you learn.

4. Can we ask anything of God and expect to receive it? Read 1 John 5:14 and record the condition of our prayers.

5. Our prayers are conditioned on God's will. We can and should go to God with freedom and openness in our words and requests but surrender our desires and will to align with God's. How different our prayers might be and how much more confident we can be if we know God answers according to His will. Knowing this truth, how does it change the way you approach God in prayer?

6. 1 John 5:16-17 is met with some interpretational challenges. Because we see in a mirror dimly these verses can cause us to scratch our heads in puzzlement. I pray that the questions you answer will guide you in the right direction. Read 1 John 5:16-17. You can write out the verses if that helps you slow down and take in the verses.

- 7. Who is John addressing in verse 16?
- 8. What is the situation presented in 1 John 5:16?
- 9. What are you or I asked to do in this verse?
- 10. What will God do in answer to this prayer according to 1 John 5:16?

11. All sin is deserving of death, physical and eternal. 1 John 5:17 tells us all unrighteousness is sin, and there is a sin not leading to death. What sin does not lead to death? Read 1 John 2:9, Psalm 32:5, Proverbs 28:13, Titus 2:14.

12. Read the following scripture references from 1 John and record what they teach and how they relate to the brother committing sin not leading to death.

1 John 1:7-

1 John 2:1-3-

1 John 2:12-

- 13. Every believer stands before God with the need to confess their own sin. I cannot continually confess your sins for you before God, nor you mine. However, these verses show the need and command to look after our brothers and sisters in Christ. It is part of the love John has been pressing into our hearts and minds in this entire book. If we love each other we will look not only after physical needs but spiritual needs as well. How does knowing this truth change how we look at our brothers and sisters in Christ? How should we respond after learning this truth?
- 14. According to John in 1 John 5:16, there is a sin that leads to death. What is the sin that leads to death? Can a true blood-bought believer sin unto death? Can we know if someone is sinning unto death? I believe the Scriptures teach a true believer can sin unto

physical death but not spiritual death. Read the accounts recorded in Acts 5:1-10 and 1 Corinthians 11:17-32. Record what they say concerning the believer.

15. How should we examine our own selves in light of what we just learned from Acts and 1 Corinthians? Read Hebrews 12:16. Record what you learn from this verse about God in relation to His children.

16. How much more should we look after our brothers and sisters in Christ? Can we know when a brother or sister has sinned physically unto death? I do not think so. That is in the secret will of God, but some indicators should make us stop and pause. What is the sin that leads to death? Read Matthew 12:31 with Hebrews 10:26-29. Record what these verses teach about unbelief.

- 17. Read 1 John 2:22-23 with 1 John 3:4. Are those mentioned in these verses in Christ? Are they covered with the blood of Christ?
- 18. Those who do not believe in the Son of God, who do not confess they are sinners, are in unbelief and sinning unto eternal death. So, there is a sin that leads to eternal death. Can we know when someone has sinned unto death? There is one way we know. If someone dies and has never received Jesus Christ, they have died an eternal death. Is there a time when God gives someone over to their sins with no way of repentance? Yes! But again, you and I do not know that point in time; it is in the secret counsel of God. Read the account of Esau in Hebrews 12:16-17 and record what this verse says. Note how verse 16 describes Esau.

- 19. We can also tie the sin unto death mentioned by John with apostasy. Read 1 John 2:19. How does this verse describe the person mentioned?
- 20. What do we know about the one born of God stated in 1 John 5:18? What do we need to remember when reading this statement? Review 1 John 3:9, 4:7, 5:1, and 5:4.
- 21. Who protects the one born of God, according to 1 John 5:18?
- 22. What encouragement to know the children of God are kept. Look up the word keep from 1 John 5:18 and record what you learn about Christ and His protection. Keep: 5083.

- 23. Now look up the following verses from 1 John that support what you learned from your word study on keep.
 - 1 John 2:1-

1 John 2:14-

1 John 2:20-

1 John 3:9-

1 john 4:13-

1 John 5:4-

- 24. Not only do we know Him, know we have eternal life through Him, we are also protected in Him. What other truth do you learn from 1 John 5:20?
- 25. The whole world system lies in the power of the evil one. Sit on this truth for a minute. Think about the ramifications or effects of this truth. Now read 1 John 5:20. What do you learn about the Son of God from this verse?
- 26. What has Jesus Christ given to the beloved? 1 John 5:20.
- 27. Why has He given you understanding? 1 John 5:20.
- 28. What last instruction does John give in 1 John 5:21?
- 29. You have completed a deep study in the book of 1 John! Bless you beloved of God. What truths have impacted you the most from your study in 1 John? How has your understanding been challanged? In what ways has your walk with the Lord been altered through your time spent in the word of God?
